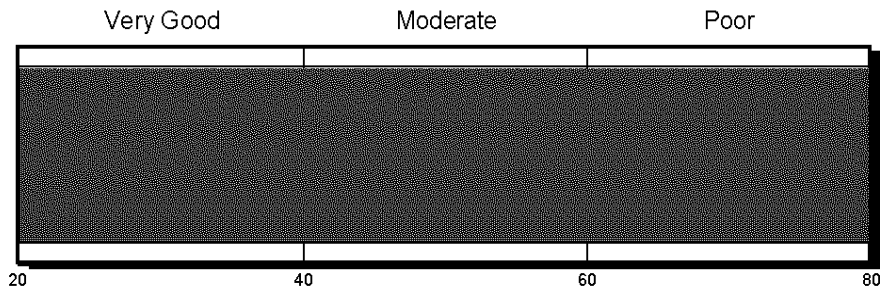

Cautionary Remark: The Brief FAM is designed to act as a very quick and efficient tool used for preliminary screening purposes and to help determine whether follow-up investigation or intervention is required. A full family assessment must also include information from other tests (e.g., full versions of the FAM), as well as observations, and interviews.

The Overall T-Score (T = 84)

Probable Family Difficulties. The score obtained indicates that John perceives difficulties in family functioning. It is recommended that T-scores in this range be followed by an administration of the long version of the FAM.

Item Level Interpretation

An examination of responses to specific items can indicate particular areas of difficulty. When the overall T-score is high, the items may indicate the basis for the difficulties. When the overall T-score is not high, an item level analysis may indicate a very specific problem area worth working on, even though overall family functioning does not seem to be a concern.

The following responses may indicate a specific problem area:
